

Navigating Change: Developments in CLD Practice

A Report on the 2025 Tayside and Fife CLD Professional Learning Alliance (TFPLA) Conference





Navigating Change: Developments in CLD Practice, a conference for CLD practitioners across Tayside and Fife was held on Wednesday 26th March 2025 at the Michelin Innovation Parc in Dundee. The programme was jampacked with keynotes from Steven Grieg (Gannochy Trust keynote) and Keren Hadden and Laura Cooney from CAMHS (CAMHS keynote), and five workshops held across the day; some running twice. The day closed with a panel question and answer session with representatives from University of Dundee, the CLD Standards Council, Dundee City Council and Education Scotland.

The themes for the day's learning were identified through questions asked to CLD practitioners across Tayside & Fife about their professional learning needs.

Keynotes:

'What if we collaborate?'

Steven Grieg, Development Manager The Gannochy Trust

Steven Greig worked for Youth Scotland for 25 years supporting 1,200 voluntary run youth groups. Steven established the Hi5 Awards, Dynamic Youth Awards, Scottish Youth Achievement Awards, and managed the creation of the Awards Network in Scotland. He moved to a new post within the Gannochy Trust in 2017 as Development Manager to maximize the impact of the Trust's grant-making, assets, and resources for the benefit of people, communities, and organizations. The Strategic Youth Work Partnership was established in 2019 through collaboration between The Gannochy Trust and Perth and Kinross Council. Its purpose was to shift the competitive nature of funding youth work towards encouraging cooperation among third sector youth work providers, creating a strategic partnership for universal youth work provision throughout the region, and providing longer-term funding for sustainable third sector youth work provision. At the end of the first five-year contracts, the number of young people receiving youth work provision doubled, delivery localities increased, more staff and volunteers were involved, and youth work charities reported increased resilience and sustainability.






'Supporting Young Minds: Shaping the Future Through Collective Action'

Laura and Kerren explored the importance of prioritising the mental health of children and young people. Workshops

Turning Numbers into Compelling Narratives Steven Grieg, Development Manager The Gannochy Trust

With a devasting decline in youth work for decades, this workshop showcased how data can be used to make a compelling case for effective change, simply by working differently. A story of genuine collaboration between a Council, a funding Trust, and third sector youth work agencies.

Digital in CLD: Tools, Tips and Trends Darran Gillan SCVO Digital

This workshop explored innovative digital tools for CLD practice, their benefits and challenges, and best practice for effective integration.

Community Development in Action Sarah Boath Scottish Community Development Centre (SCDC)

Exploring enablers and barriers to community engagement practice. This workshop aimed to help practitioners increase their skills and confidence in working alongside communities.



Career Pathways in CLD

Dr Alan Mackie, University of Dundee, and Dr Mei-Li Roberts, University Highlands & Islands

This workshop encouraged participants to reflect on their career journey so far and consider the barriers and catalysts that have supported development. The available pathways to CLD accreditation were discussed alongside how we might better support and develop the workforce.

Planet Youth — a Preventative Approach Jennifer Miller, Angus Council

The aim of Planet youth is to build and strengthen positive protective factors in and around young people's lives to try and prevent or delay the onset of risk-taking behaviours in their teenage years such as vaping. This workshop took participants through some key data from Angus, the methodology used with Planet youth and lessons learned so far.
