

Writing Literature Review PPT: How to Build a Strong Presentation That Gets Results

- Work-life boundaries

5. Methods Used by Researchers

Show whether studies used surveys, interviews, experiments, case studies, or mixed methods.

6. Key Findings

Summarize what the evidence suggests overall.

7. Gaps and Limitations

This is one of the most valuable sections. It proves critical thinking.

8. Implications for Your Research

Connect the review to your next step.

9. References

Use concise citation format on the final slide.

What Actually Matters Most (Priority Order)

1. **Clear argument:** The audience should understand your central message quickly.
2. **Smart grouping:** Themes matter more than source-by-source summaries.
3. **Evidence balance:** Include both supporting and conflicting findings.
4. **Research gap:** Explain what remains unresolved.
5. **Visual clarity:** Clean slides improve credibility.
6. **Delivery:** Even excellent slides fail with rushed explanation.

How Many Slides Should a Literature Review PPT Have?

Presentation Type	Recommended Slides	Estimated Time
Short class task	6–8	5 minutes
Standard academic presentation	10–15	10–15 minutes
Proposal defense	12–20	15–25 minutes
Conference version	10–18	10–20 minutes

Too many slides usually signal weak editing. Too few often means missing depth.

How to Turn Research Articles Into Good Slides

Many students read ten papers and then paste notes into slides. That creates dense blocks nobody can follow.

Use this method instead:

1. Read each source and extract one useful contribution.
2. Tag similar ideas together.
3. Create categories or themes.
4. Compare results across studies.
5. Write one sentence insight for each theme.
6. Add one chart, timeline, or comparison table.

Mistakes People Make When Writing Literature Review PPT

1. Listing Sources One by One

This becomes a reading log, not a review.

2. Too Much Text

If a slide looks like a textbook page, the audience stops listening.

3. No Research Gap

Without a gap, your presentation has no direction.

4. Weak Visual Hierarchy

Everything the same size means nothing stands out.

5. Overusing Quotes

Paraphrase and synthesize. Direct quotes are rarely needed.

6. Ignoring Contradictions

If studies disagree, discuss why. Sample size? Context? Method?

What Others Rarely Tell You

Audience memory is limited. They will not remember ten studies. They will remember three insights and one clear gap.

Design affects perceived quality. Even solid research can seem weak when slides are messy.

Confidence comes from structure. When slides flow logically, speaking becomes easier.

You do not need every source on screen. Mention only what supports the point being discussed.

Design Rules for a Strong Literature Review PPT

- Use large readable fonts.
- Keep consistent colors.
- Limit each slide to one main idea.
- Use charts instead of paragraphs when possible.
- Leave white space.
- Use bold text sparingly.
- Keep references on final slide.
